1. About American Samoa

American Samoa is a group of five volcanic islands located in the South Pacific Ocean (roughly 14° N and 170° W) approximately half way between Hawaii and New Zealand. American Samoa is an unincorporated territory of the United States. The President of the United States has assigned administration of American Samoa to the Secretary of the Interior.

American Samoa has five volcanic islands with limited coastline accessible to ships. There are two coral reefs that are part of the territory: Rose Island and Swains Island, which are low, tropical atolls. The total land area of American Samoa is 199 kilometers squared (km2), or 76 square miles (mi2), with 116 km (72 miles) of coast line. Natural hazards include susceptibility to typhoons between November and April. American Samoa has a tropical marine climate that is warm and humid with little seasonal temperature variation. The typical dry season occurs between May and October, and the rainy season is between November and April.

2. Critical infrastructure

Due to American Samoa's extreme geographic isolation, relief and assistance from outside areas following a natural disaster takes several days to arrive and is limited to supplies and equipment that can be transported by air. The nearest United States assistance center would be the state of Hawaii, nearly 2,600 miles northwest of the territory. Infrastructure required for daily life and public safety operations (including roadways, air and seaports, communication lines, potable water and food supply and distribution systems, power lines and plants, fuel, the

hospital, etc.) are all considered critical. Nearly all of the critical facilities are particularly vulnerable due to their proximity to the shoreline and low elevation.

American Samoa telecommunications infrastructure is not as extensive and developed in comparison to an average state in the United States. The availability of affordable broadband services for its citizens is very limited. Presently none of the local carriers provide 4G LTE services in American Samoa. Broadband infrastructure is very limited and the bandwidth is expensive. The American Samoa Government hopes to leverage resources in developing a solid broadband infrastructure for emergency communications through developing strategies with the Statewide Communication Interoperability Plan (SCIP) to include the ability to enhance and expand communications systems such as the Land Mobile Radio (LMR) infrastructure and the possibility of incorporating the use of 4G LTE technology utilizing the LMR backhaul infrastructure. Such a discussion and planning process is what American Samoa proposes with this application for SLIGP 2.0 funding. In the absence of a comprehensive strategy, American Samoa, through the American Samoa Department of Homeland Security, conducts regular updates of its SCIP and the Tactical Interoperable Communications Plan (TICP). The emergence of the First Responder Network Authority (FirstNet) may allow for future upgrades for American Samoa in response to evolving technologies and operational tactics.

3. Villages, counties & districts

The Territory of American Samoa is a single level government comprised of villages, counties and districts. As reported in the American Samoa 2006 Statistical Yearbook, the territory is comprised of 82 villages which make up the following districts and counties.

Listed are the four districts and their respective population based on the census of 2000 documenting the territory's total population of 57,291: Eastern (23,441), Manu'a (1,378), Swains Island (37), and Western (32,435).

4. Public Safety Response Agencies

Two major emergency first response agencies serve all the citizens of the Territory of American Samoa. The police and fire operate under the Department of Public Safety and the Emergency Medical Services operate under the American Samoa Tropical Medical Center Authority.

Other response agencies include the Aircraft Rescue and Firefighter (ARFF) division of the Department of Port Administration, which responds to the needs of the airport and its confines. The Territorial Emergency Management Coordinating Office (TEMCO), a main component of the American Samoa Department of Homeland Security serves as the territorial emergency management mechanism. It facilitates and provides immediate response to threats and natural disasters utilizing the primary Emergency Operations Center (EOC) and its 24/7 Watch Center for the coordination of needed resources. These agencies are responsible for administering public safety services on all populated territorial islands.

Federal, military/non-military partners and non-governmental organizations (NGOs) that maintain a presence in the Territory of American Samoa participate in disaster response and recovery efforts as illustrated in the Territorial Emergency Operations Plan (TEOP). These partners include the US Coast Guard and Army Reserves, the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), the Transportation Security Administration (TSA), the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), the National Parks Service (NPS) and the American Red Cross.

The two major first responder agencies in American Samoa are the Department of Public Safety (DPS), which includes the police and fire, and the Department of Port Administration, which includes the Aircraft Rescue and Firefighter (ARFF), Airport and Port divisions. These agencies are responsible for administering public safety services on all populated territorial islands. Public safety responding entities in the territory communicate primarily via voice systems that are isolated and do not include security provisions. Police and fire services are on shared radio frequencies and utilize a unilateral dispatch system. Each public entity has an independent stand-alone Land Mobile Radio (LMR) communications system with limited interoperable capabilities.

5. SLIGP Planning Project Proposal

American Samoa Department of Homeland Security (ASDHS) as the SAA and the designated entity to coordinate the Nationwide Public Safety Broadband network (NPSBN) through the State and Local Implementation Grant Program (SLIGP) 2.0, proposes the following activities and objectives to be funded through the SLIGP.

- Expand and improve the existing Territorial Interoperability Communications
 governance structure with the local broadband network through the Homeland Security
 Advisory Council (HSAC);
- (2) Develop staffing plans for the management and governing of the broadband network for continuing data collection activities by formalizing a SLIGP 2.0 office/team of full time planning staff to oversee the implementation of the broadband program within the territory;
- (3) Utilize the SLIGP 2.0 office/team to develop procedures that will incorporate the functions or roles of traditional officials/leaders, private and government sectors, and public representation to secure their input in the planning of the broadband network.
- (4) Develop an outreach campaign through the SLIGP 2.0 office/team and the broadband network user group to educate the community and key stakeholder partners regarding the broadband network and the nationwide public safety broadband network and initiative upon request from FirstNet;
- (5) Utilize the SLIGP 2.0 office/team to develop policies and procedures on the role and functionality of the broadband network that will also encompass interagency and entity memorandums of agreement with service providers; and

(6) Incorporate the formation of the broadband network into the SCIP that identifies the territory's existing public safety needs and gaps which the Nationwide Broadband Network and FirstNet can address through the implementation of this technology and solution.

SLIGP Planning Project Proposal – Descriptive Narrative

(1) Expand and improve the existing Territorial Interoperability Communications governance structure with the local broadband network through the Homeland Security Advisory Council (HSAC)

The proposed expansion activities seek to improve upon the existing territorial communications governance structure and redefine tasks and objectives within the SCIP and TICP that have been developed and will be updated through the SLIGP 2.0 office/team under the guidance of the American Samoa SWIC. The SLIGP 2.0 office/team shall further organize the focus and dedication of the broadband network toward planning goals and objectives set forth by the SLIGP 2.0 grant.

The American Samoa Statewide Interoperability Coordinator (AS-SWIC) and Single Point of Contact (SPOC) is currently assigned as added oversight responsibility and part time effort within the capacity of the deputy director of ASDHS.

(2) Develop staffing plans for the management and governing of the broadband network for continuing data collection activities by formalizing a SLIGP 2.0 office/team of full time planning staff to oversee the implementation of the broadband program within the territory

American Samoa proposes to formalize a SLIGP 2.0 office/team of full time planning staff to work in coordination with the broadband network in overseeing and managing the entire

broadband program within the territory. The office/team is headed by a Program Manager whose position is funded under the SLIGP 2.0 and is intended to be a full time employee. The Program Manager is also committed to participate fully in all activities relative to the American Samoa SCIP and TICP utilizing the public safety broadband network and solutions. The Program Manager reports directly to the territory's Single Point of Contact (SPOC) with oversight and management responsibility of the project office/team and the overall effort.

The office/team, in coordination with the governance network, would serve as the State representative for the program and keep executives and/or HSAC members informed of the program.

The AS-SWIC/SPOC will provide guidance to the Program Manager and planning project in the development of the broadband network and incorporating these strategies into the review and update process of the SCIP and TICP. The AS-SWIC/SPOC shall also work with SLIGP 2.0 office/team to inventory existing Interoperability communication infrastructure for planning purposes and to provide an assessment to assist the first responders and the broadband network working group with planning discussions and activities when developing the broadband network.

The staffing plan proposed through this SLIGP 2.0 includes a SLIGP/FirstNet Program Manager, 1 Administrative Support Staff, 1 IT Administrator, and 1 Communications Specialist. The Program Manager will work to liaise with first responders and partner agencies to develop the plans and policies as allowable by SLIGP2.0. The Program Manager will also manage planning activities and objectives set forth through the SLIGP 2.0. The Program Manager will also assist in coordination and facilitation of policy development and interagency agreements, while leveraging other programs and existing communication resources when possible. The proposal would be to use personnel with technical expertise in police, fire and emergency medical services from other federal programs with a stake or vested interest in FirstNet Program to assist in the planning.

The Administrative Support Staff will be responsible for support functions of the FirstNet/SLIGP Program and management. Such functions will include scheduling of meetings, documentation/scribing, meeting preparations and compilations of meeting documentation. They will also provide support and assistance to the SLIGP 2.0 Office/team and ASDHS with activities related to the SLIGP and the broadband network.

The IT Administrator and Communications Specialists will contribute time and effort to the SLIGP 2.0 office/team and activities on related projects associated with interoperable communications for the public safety community. They will also be part of all planning meetings and forums to discuss the territory's communications infrastructure and interoperability specifically for the first responders and public safety community.

In the unique setup of the territorial government and relation to the overall local community approach, Office of Samoan Affairs/Local Government is the vessel by which SLIGP 2.0 Office/team will provide outreach to village communities for input during the planning activities of the SLIGP 2.0. The Territory of American Samoa, through the SLIGP 2.0 Office/team, plans to use SLIGP 2.0 funding to support efforts to update the SCIP/TICP by adding public safety wireless broadband strategic goals/initiatives and accomplishing goals set forth in the SCIP Implementation Report.

Under the SLIGP 2.0, other activities will include the <u>development of plans and policies</u> to manage the wireless and broadband communications network infrastructure in American Samoa. All activities stated throughout the proposal will not include the actual management itself, just the development of plans and policies. Planning will be conducted by the proposed staff of the SLIGP 2.0 Office/team in coordination with the broadband network. This will be a continued collaborative effort between government and private service providers to provide an adequate plan of the wireless and broadband infrastructure in American Samoa.

(3) Utilize the SLIGP 2.0 office/team to develop procedures that will incorporate the functions or roles of traditional officials/leaders, private and government sectors, and public representation to secure their input in the planning of the broadband network.

The unique makeup of the territorial state of American Samoa through the traditional governance structure with the leadership of the Office of Samoan Affair/Local Government (OSA) comprising of all county and village councils, county chiefs, village chiefs, village mayors, and district leaders allow for a structured approach in engaging the grassroots leaders and the community in the development of the broadband network. The OSA is a department/office of the American Samoa Government and its director is the Secretary of Samoan Affairs who occasionally assists in facilitating meetings and issues involving land and title disputes and other problems or issues involving the culture requiring traditional governance or mediator for communication related projects.

The SLIGP 2.0 office/team will work through the governance structure and the OSA in engaging discussions and input on the development of a broadband network plan. This will assist as well in assessing the needs in particular the remote and isolated villages that lack some of the critical infrastructure including broadband and communications capabilities.

As a Territory of the United States of America, American Samoa (AS) is a non-contiguous island community located in the South Pacific below the Equator with international bodies of water surrounding her borders. In this regard, AS does not have intrastate regional committees that are involved with public safety communications.

Given the territory's geography and isolation from the rest of the United States, the territories in the Pacific jurisdiction do share similar challenges being part of the Pacific. ASDHS and the working group will seek to engage and form a regional public safety broadband network working group with the Pacific jurisdiction territories of Guam, Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, and the state of Hawaii. The ASDHS and the working group will also look at

regional resources that can be leveraged to assist in collaborating and improving interoperability capacity across the Pacific jurisdiction.

(4) Develop an outreach campaign through the SLIGP 2.0 office/team and the broadband network user group to educate the community and key stakeholder partners regarding the broadband network and the nationwide public safety broadband network and initiative upon request from FirstNet

The SLIGP 2.0 office/team and the governance structure led by the SLIGP/FirstNet Program Manager will lead the development of an outreach campaign for all public safety network stakeholder and community partners. Doing so will ensure proper delivery of awareness programs to increase the probability of successful deployment of the broadband network system requirements upon full implementation. The outreach will include educational activities as well as forums, town hall meetings and discussions regarding strategic and operational plans for the broadband network. Strategies will include the traditional government structure as well as local government entities in these activities. This will of course only be done if requested by FirstNet.

(5) Utilize the SLIGP 2.0 office/team to develop policies and procedures on the role and functionality of the broadband network that will also encompass interagency and entity memorandums of agreement with service providers

The SLIGP 2.0 office/team and the governance structure will facilitate the identification of the users of the public safety broadband network through planning meetings and discussions around the public safety broadband network. Interagency agreements and user policies will be developed by the SLIGP 2.0 office/team and the governance structure; these will be coordinated and compiled by the SLIGP/FirstNet Program Manager.

The AS-SWIC/SPOC and the SLIGP/FirstNet Program Manager will develop a process of developing and approving policies for the governance structure. These policies will be documented and incorporated into the overall strategic and operational plan for the broadband network.

(6) Incorporate the formation of the broadband network into the SCIP that identifies the territory's existing public safety needs and gaps which the Nationwide Broadband Network and FirstNet can address through the implementation of this technology and solution, as well as monitoring and demonstrating progress through development of milestones and goals to meet the needs identified therein.

The SLIGP/FirstNet Program Manager shall be responsible for coordination and compiling of a Strategic and Operational Plan for the governance structure. This plan will be incorporated and will complement the overall strategies set forth in the AS SCIP.

Project Feasibility

The proposed staffing includes existing experienced personnel of the ASDHS to support this project. Personnel who will staff, support and oversee the project have extensive project management knowledge and technical experience. American Samoa is very limited in human resources. This proposal is put together to effectively utilize existing technical experience and capacity available in the territory through team efforts and collaboration. American Samoa has unique challenges compared to other states and territories because of its remoteness and isolation. The SLIGP will provide the territory with financial resources to assist in developing a plan through leadership.
