State and Local Implementation Grant Program (SLIGP) 2.0 Application Narrative

California Overview

California is third most extensive state by area, and the most populous state in the United States, with a population of 39.3 million residents. The population is projected to reach 40 million by 2018, and 50 million by 2055. With this many people, California has more than 28 million calls to 911 per year to its 441 Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs) across the state. The land mass consists of 163,696 square miles and the diverse geography ranges from the Pacific Coast in the west, to the Sierra Nevada mountain range in the east; from the redwood–Douglas fir forests in the northwest to the Mojave Desert in the southeast. The Central Valley, a major agricultural area, dominates the state's center. The State of California contains more forestland than any other state except Alaska. There are 58 counties in the state, and there are 482 cities and towns in the state with Los Angeles being the largest at over 3.9 million people. California is home to more people of Native American/ Alaska Native heritage than any other state in the Country. There are currently 109 federally recognized Indian tribes in California and 78 entities petitioning for recognition. Tribes in California currently have nearly 100 separate reservations or Rancherias. Due to California's unique geography, topography, population, and recent disaster response and recovery needs, in the event of excess grant funding, there is an additional need to contribute to the planning and supporting of communications systems within the state.

Because of California's vast and diverse terrain, there are large gaps in cellular LTE coverage. Coverage is improving but still remains a significant challenge for any and all commercial broadband providers. Availability, capacity, speed, and provider choice are key concerns for public safety agencies and organizations. Adoption of the FirstNet broadband network represents a significant step forward in providing California with the progression needed to evolve its cellular network capabilities.

At the state level, California's public safety broadband communication issues and functions are primarily governed by the California Office of Emergency Services (CalOES). The CalFRN Board of Directors (CalFRN Board) consists of 12 multi-disciplinary members representing a cross-section of public safety, state, local, and tribal expertise at the executive leadership level. The CalFRN Board serves as California's advisory body to CalOES. CalOES will oversee California's plan to establish, formalize and institutionalize a process to support the statewide public safety broadband network. CalOES, based on recommendations and support from the CalFRN Board, provides a liaison for local governments, law enforcement, fire, emergency management, and tribal entities. Responsibilities of the CalFRN Board include coordination, recommendations regarding policy, training and compliance. The CalFRN Board also provides direction to the CalFRN advisory committees leveraging their expertise for recommendations on a variety of CalFRN activities.

The CalFRN Board operates at two levels, (1) directors and (2) advisory committees. Advisory committees are established as warranted and currently include:

- California Statewide Interoperability Executive Committee (CalSIEC)
- Mutual Aid Regional Advisory Committee (MARAC)
- State 9-1-1 Advisory Board

- Technical Advisory Committee
- Tribal Advisory Committee

The advisory committee structure is intended to add depth and definition to the CalFRN Board to better equip the Board to engage with FirstNet at the national level. The committees further facilitate local input and participation.

All planned activities listed within this application are in accordance with Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) 2018-NTIA-SLIGP-2.

SLIGP 2.0 Staffing Plan

The California SLIGP staff will operate within the Public Safety Broadband Network Division (PSBN) of CalOES and under the direction and guidance of the California Single Point of Contact (SPOC). The staff will consist of a Telecommunications Systems Manager I (TSM1), three Telecommunications Systems Analyst II positions (TSA2), and a Staff Services Analyst (SSA). All of these positions will consist of a Full Time Equivalent (FTE) staffing position at 90% funding. A portion of indirect support staff manning costs will also be utilized to ensure proper grant accounting; documentation, execution and reporting are taking place in accordance with DOC/NTIA stipulations. Contracted professional services and/or temporary/short term employment considerations will be determined by necessity to meet workload during the grant period.

The Statewide Interoperability Coordinator (SWIC) will continue to coordinate and collaborate with the PSBN TSM1 on matters related to NPSBN buildout, and how they affect the interoperability spectrum within California itself. The CalOES PSBN TSM1 will coordinate with the CalOES Grant Manager for budgetary activities to include planning, obligation, disbursement tracking, and potential audit oriented activities.

The PSBN TSM1 will have the following primary responsibilities:

- Oversight on the daily management activities of the SLIGP 2.0 grant's allowable activities
- Supervision and leadership of the TSA2 positions, SSA, and associated duties
- Primary budgetary planning, tracking and reporting in collaboration with the CalOES Grant Manager
- Operational and strategic level planning in collaboration with FirstNet and AT&T
- Collaboration, planning, and educational data sharing with the communications governance entities in California (CalFRN Board, and the SWIC)
- Continue education/outreach/data collection in collaboration with the CalFRN and FirstNet

Summary of Planned Activities

The California SLIGP 2.0 program will focus on all of the allowable activities, as described in subsequent paragraphs, and for specific allowable activities for States where FirstNet is deploying the RAN (Opt-In States).

- Single officer (or governmental body) and staff to, at a minimum, provide for ongoing coordination with NTIA and implementation of grant funds
- Existing governance body to provide input to the single officer and to contribute towards
 planning activities to further identify potential public safety users of the NPSBN and prepare for
 data sharing
- Data collection in specific areas identified to be helpful as requested by FirstNet
- Development of policies and agreements to increase sharing of data between existing public safety systems across various agencies within the State or territory using the NPSBN
- Individuals, such as the single officer and governing body members, to perform planning activities to help FirstNet and its partner further identify potential public safety users of the NPSBN
- Planning efforts to help FirstNet gain inclusion on applicable statewide contract vehicles
- Planning activities to prepare for emergency communications technology transitions
- Activities to identify and plan for the transition of public safety applications, software, and databases
- Identifying and documenting on-going coverage needs/gaps within the State
- Activities to convene stakeholder outreach events to continue planning for NPSBN implementation, as requested by FirstNet

Execution of Planned Activities

The following lists, "by objective," goals on how the California SLIGP 2.0 program will conduct and support the specific allowable activities during the proposed grant award period.

1. Single officer (or governmental body) and staff to, at a minimum, provide for ongoing coordination with NTIA and implementation of grant funds.

- a. Current: CalOES is organized under the supervision of the Director, who in turn, reports directly to the Governor of the State of California. The Chief Deputy Director reports to the Director. The Deputy Director of Logistics Management reports to the Chief Deputy Director. The Assistant Director of Public Safety Communications (PSC) reports to the Deputy Director of Logistics Management. The Assistant Director of PSC is designated as both the SPOC and the state designee for the SLIGP grant management activities. See designation letter.
- b. **Objective**: The SPOC will provide direction and guidance to the SWIC. In turn, the SWIC will manage the details of the SLIGP program in accordance with DOC/NTIA guidelines and grant stipulations, state law, and FirstNet guidance.
- c. **Outcome**: The California SLIGP staff will remain in place for positive continuity as the transition occurs between SLIGP 1.0 and SLIGP 2.0 grants. Normal quarterly adherence to budget formulation, expense accounting, and performance progress reporting will occur accurately and on time. As allowable activities and costs change, so will subsequent tracking and reporting.

2. Existing governance body to provide input to the single officer and to contribute towards planning activities to further identify potential public safety users of the NPSBN and prepare for data sharing.

- **a. Current**: The CalOES Assistant Director of PSC is the SPOC and serves as the chair of the CalFRN. The Cal FRN is established as an advisory Board to the Director of CalOES. The CalFRN coordinates information, initiatives, and decision items concerning public safety communication matters to include recommendations that will be used for the implementation of the National Public Safety Broadband Network (NPSBN) within California.
 - The California Statewide Interoperability Executive Council (CalSIEC) is established as an advisory board to the director of CalOES. CalSIEC is comprised of representatives from each of the four planning areas in California and the SWIC serves as an advisor to the CalSIEC and participates in all planning area meetings as well as the quarterly CalSIEC meetings. The SWIC and CalSIEC members ensure that the recommendations of the CalSIEC are included in quarterly meetings of the CalFRN.
- **b. Objective**: The SWIC will work in direct coordination with the CalFRN Board, the SPOC, PSBN TSM, and FirstNet.
- c. Outcome: Moving beyond the "opt in" decision and forward into the actual implementation phase will signify a positive and more proactive change in the relationship between the CalFRN, PSBN TSM1, SPOC, and FirstNet. Additional coordination, collaboration, and data sharing efforts will merge on a more frequent basis to ensure the NPSBN buildout is both visible and progressive. The SWIC will brief updates to the CalFRN on a bi-monthly basis. The SWIC will update the CalFRN chairperson for each region when requested and when invited to attend

CalFRN Board meetings. Data sharing products will be screened and released based on adherence to the ongoing state plan.

3. Data collection in specific areas identified to be helpful as requested by FirstNet.

- a. Current: Data collection requests from FirstNet are anticipated to be oriented towards two distinct categories. First, will be continuing some level of outreach activity focused on identification of potential user adoption agencies and groups. Many of the potential primary users have been identified are being approached directly by FirstNet/AT&T. Some of the extended users and volunteer/private industry partners may need additional follow-up information. Second, will be on-going coverage concerns and priorities. These efforts are evolving the discussion and information sharing amongst all parties involved.
- **b. Objective**: Prior to SLIGP 2.0 initiation, the CalOES PSBN staff will begin exchanging and gathering data needs assessed by the CalFRN Board, SWIC and FirstNet. Monthly updates will be conducted between PSBN staff and FirstNet representatives for California. Applicable data will be reported to both the SPOC and the CalFRN Board.
- **c. Outcome**: The CalOES PSBN staff remains proactive, flexible and adaptive to on-going data collection, data sharing, and data analysis needs from FirstNet planners. To date, the specifics of these items are still being developed in coordination with FirstNet and their partner.

4. Development of policies and agreements to increase sharing of data between existing public safety systems across various agencies within the State or territory using the NPSBN.

- a. Current: California public safety communications policy and agreement formulation is subject to procedures identified by California Code, the California Interoperability Field Operations Guide (Cal-IFOG) and CalSIEC procedures. The key to this engagement is local deliberation and issue identification brought forward to the CalSIEC by the CalFRN Board. The CalFRN Board promotes shared decision making with local stakeholders, promote transparency, promote sustainability, establish a shared understanding of interoperability goals and seek ways to actively involve stakeholders from a multi-agency and multi-jurisdictional perspective.
- **b. Objective**: The CalOES PSBN staff will work in unison with California Code, CalOES policy directives, SPOC guidance, and SWIC guidance. Policy guidance and directives will seek to promote enhanced awareness and transparency regarding the FirstNet implementation activities from Initial Operational Capability (IOC) Phase 1 through IOC Phase 2.
- c. Outcome: State and district level policy documents will be drafted and reviewed by the CalFRN Board, SWIC, and SPOC. CalOES PSBN staff will remain engaged in all policy recommendations in concert with stakeholders and management processes.

5. Individuals, such as the single officer and governing body members, to perform planning activities to help FirstNet and its partner further identify potential public safety users of the NPSBN.

a. Current: Previous and current outreach efforts are focused on education of the FirstNet concept and NPSBN vision, based on the 911 Commission Report. Details relayed to stakeholders have been fairly generic, and conceptual versus technical. Priority issues have been focused on the key issues of coverage, capacity, affordability, and reliability. These will remain forefront on the scope of concerns for all potential users.

- b. Objective: Limited, yet extended, outreach events, as requested by FirstNet, will be planned in conjunction with local and state conferences known to exist. Examples include; California Sheriff's Association, California Association of Police Chiefs, California Emergency Management Services Association, CalNENA conferences, etc. PSBN participation in CalFRN meetings will increase, and facilitate follow-up outreach and education to potential users across California. Outreach and education will include both CalOES PSBN staff and FirstNet/AT&T representatives in many cases.
- **c. Outcome**: Increased knowledge, transparency and awareness of FirstNet across the local and state spectrum of available primary, extended, and special users.

6. Planning efforts to help FirstNet gain inclusion on applicable statewide contract vehicles.

- a. Current: Current statewide contracts are handled by the California Department of Technology -Procurement.
- b. Objective: As FirstNet is implemented within the state, it is anticipated that primary and extended user agencies will apply for regional and statewide subscriber procurement. For example, the California Department of Transportation (DOT) is an extended primary responder for all traffic related issues in all areas of the state, and would most likely be a FirstNet subscriber.
- c. Outcome: Public Safety entities within California will be provided with economically sound and feasible means to procure contracts with FirstNet, allowing enhanced communications and increasing efficiency in responding to emergencies across the state. The CalOES PSBN staff will only facilitate interaction between vendors and/or FirstNet and will not participate in the marketing or procurement process.

7. Planning activities to prepare for emergency communications technology transitions.

- a. Current: As mentioned in previous paragraphs, the key driving entities in the California Public Safety Communications landscape include the CalSIEC, SPOC, SWIC, CalFRN Board, and local communications-oriented public and private partners. California has recently updated the CalIFOG) as of October 2016. While this document potentially requires updates and revisions, it signifies the strategic framework document for statewide communications. The joint immersion of NPSBN, Land Mobile Radio systems, Information Technology, Next Generation 911, Long Term Evolution technology and adaptation, all make up a more robust interoperable environment for emergency communications within California.
- b. **Objective:** Governance bodies and administrative process will be key to conducting local, regional, and statewide communications planning in the interagency environment. These efforts must be coordinated and a shared vision created between the CalOES and other technology-based entities such as the California Department of Technology (DOT).
- c. Outcome: We will put together a plan for the integration of currently used systems to be merged in order to mirror sustainable interoperable communications with emerging technologies. Emphasis on the interoperability continuum is essential. Key elements include collaborative governance, standard operating procedures, technology, planning of training and exercises, and developing a plan for the on-going usage of critical communications systems. CalOES PSBN staff members will remain engaged in all governance and communications-based discussions and processes. All activities will be conducted in accordance with the allowable activities listed in the SLIGP 2.0 NOFO.

8. Activities to identify and plan for the transition of public safety applications, software, and databases.

- a. Current: CalOES staff planners as well as specific municipal response agencies have participated in multi-year Public Safety Communications Research (PSCR) informational conferences and workshops. SLIGP staff has also visited and interacted with the FirstNet Innovation Lab located in Boulder, Colorado. CalOES staff and the SWIC continually participate in CalOES events and informational activities.
- b. Objective: SLIGP staff will be focused on transitioning into the NSPBN, and will remain engaged in gap analysis surveys, SWIC working projects such as production of an updated Cal-IFOG, and any relevant SAFECOM surveys. The process and implementation of new technology and systems will be presented to CalOES for further guidance, policy development, and or tasking action.
- c. **Outcome:** The primary outcome expectations for existing and new applications, hardware, software, and database systems are that they provide a more interoperable efficiency for California. Any transitions of apps, software, and databases will only be into the NSPBN.

9. Identifying and documenting on-going coverage needs/gaps within the State, as requested by FirstNet.

- **d. Current:** Recent interaction with FirstNet/AT&T RAN engineering teams have further shed light on existing LTE coverage within California. These recent meetings have also led to adaptations in the state plan, and where to provide the best coverage that meets the needs determined by public safety agencies across the state.
- e. Objective: Utilizing existing gap-analysis surveys, California will seek to maximize overall coverage from existing levels to a level that supports the maximum amount of Band 14 capabilities where they are needed most. In areas that remain remote, a successful deployable asset strategy will be planned. Gap analysis, drive testing, and coverage testing will only occur on the NPSBN during current or past IOCs.
- f. Outcome: Increased coverage and capacity for California.

10. Activities to convene stakeholder outreach events to continue planning for NPSBN implementation, as requested by FirstNet.

- a. **Current:** The California SLIGP has been proactively conducting community outreach and education across the state since 2013. California communications governance structure and process has changed during this time period.
- b. Objective: As requested by FirstNet and as funding allows, the CalOES PSBN staff will continue to schedule and conduct educational efforts statewide to all existing and potential stakeholders to include state, tribal, local and private sectors. Emphasis on rural communities, deployable strategy and transparency, engage existing and future conferences, assist FirstNet in conducting applicable workshops, conferences, and collaboration meetings with existing public safety agencies and associations.

| C. | Outcome: The CalOES PSBN staff, within the SLIGP 2.0 parameters, will persist in assisting the CalFRN Board, SPOC, and SWIC in collaborating and working with FirstNet to deploy, operate, maintain, and improve a broadband network dedicated to first responders and extended response users across California. CalOES PSBN staff will discuss and navigate network lifecycle concerns related to applications, devices, services and infrastructure costs short and long-term. |
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California State and Local Implementation Grant Program (SLIGP) 2.0 Budget Justification and Narrative

The State of California is requesting \$1,200,000.00 of federal funds in order to assist the State, local governments and tribal nations for planning and implementing a nationwide interoperable public safety broadband network. The federal funds will be matched with \$536,330.86 of non-federal funds (wages and in-kind match). The non-federal minimum for Increment 1 equates to \$199,066.04. The non-federal minimum for Increment 2 equates to \$286,656.73.

Wages

There are fourteen positions allotted for the SLIGP 2.0 grant's two-year period. There is a Public Safety Broadband Network (PSBN) Telecommunications Systems Manager 1 Supervisor (TSM 1 Sup) (at 90% of annual salary = \$141,600). The TSM reports to the Public Safety Communications (PSC) 9-1-1 Branch Manager/Career Executive Assignment B (at 25% of annual salary = \$59,622) who oversees the PSBN TSM1 and reports to the Assistant Director of PSC who is also the SPOC (20% of annual salary = \$59,990).

The TSM will supervise three Telecommunication Systems Analyst II (TSA2) positions (90% of annual salary = $$120,000 \times 3$), and one Staff Services Analyst (SSA) position (90% of annual salary = \$100,000), and this four-person team will handle the day-to-day operations of implementing the new Public Safety Broadband Network for California at the State level. The TSM will also work closely with the SPOC who serves as the Chairman of the California First Responders Network Board of Directors (CalFRN), and any of the Board's designated sub-committees.

The TSA2 positions will provide data collection in specific areas identified to be helpful as requested by FirstNet, as well as development of policies and agreements to increase sharing of data between existing public safety systems across various agencies within the State or territory using the NPSBN. They will

also identify and document on-going coverage needs/gaps within the State. Will perform activities to identify and plan for the transition of public safety applications, software, and databases.

The SSA position will also provide data collection and perform activities to convene stakeholder outreach events to continue planning for NPSBN implementation, as requested by FirstNet. This position will also provide assistance in identifying and documenting on-going coverage needs/gaps within the State. The SSA will also assist with planning efforts to help FirstNet gain inclusion on applicable statewide contract vehicles.

There are several supporting positions, including one Grant Manager (at 10% of annual salary = \$14,803) who will manage the grant, and will complete grant activities such as managing the allowable activity tasks, completing the programmatic reports, and providing updates to leadership on programmatic activity. The Staff Services Manager 1 (at 10% of annual salary = \$16,963.20) who will manage the accounting for the grant and duties will include processing invoices, tracking funds spent, and doing ASAP drawdowns. Also, the State Wide Interoperability Coordinator (SWIC) (25% of annual salary = \$59,622) who will work with emergency response leaders across all levels of government to implement a statewide strategic vision for interoperability, an Information Officer I (at 20% of annual salary = \$29,606) who will take care of Public Relations and the Media, an Associate Government Program Analyst (at 10% of annual salary = \$14,803) who will support the SPOC in administrative duties, and two Associate Information Systems Analysts (at 5% of annual salary = \$8,164 x2) who will support website development and audio/visual duties for the CalFRN Board meetings.

Total Personnel

Wages are calculated using the most recent State of California wage scale.

Total personnel wages for the two-year grant period are \$873,337.60.

Travel

The PSBN team will be traveling to meet with Stakeholders throughout California in order to foster the development of policies and agreements to increase sharing of data between existing public safety systems across various agencies within the State or territory using the NPSBN. Travel for CalFRN Board Members, the existing governance body, will provide input to the single officer and to contribute towards planning activities to further identify potential public safety users of the NPSBN and prepare for data sharing. Out of state travel will provide for ongoing coordination with the NTIA, and will allow attendance at national conferences pertaining to FirstNet.

In-State Travel

Outreach Trips to Stakeholders in California: Each year the PSBN team, consisting of five people, will travel to the 58 counties in California, and will use a combination of driving and flying. Driving is estimated at 5,500 miles at \$.54 per mile, 30 flights at \$500 each, 58 days of rental cars at \$40 per day, 50 nights of lodging at an average of \$120, 50 days of meals at \$46 per day, and 47 days of parking at \$10 each per day. Total for the two-year grant period is \$58,120 for the PSBN team. Average dollar amount per person per trip is \$501.03.

CalFRN Board Members travel quarterly to Board Meetings: We have an average of four Board Members that must travel to Sacramento for these meetings, with some coming from as far away as San Diego and Los Angeles. Four flights at \$500 each, Eight days of rental cars at \$40 per day, Four nights of lodging at an average of \$95 per night, Eight days of meals at \$46 per day, Eight days of parking at \$10 per day. This comes out to \$3,148 per member per year. Four members traveling to board meetings per year is \$12,592, for a two-year total of \$25,184. Average dollar amount per trip per person is \$887.00.

Out-of-State Travel

Executive Out of State Travel: In the grant period, two executives will take four flights to national conferences and meetings regarding FirstNet at \$600 each, 16 days of rental cars at \$40 per day, 12 nights of lodging at an average of \$170 per night, 20 days of meals at \$46 per day, and 20 days of parking at \$10 per day. Average dollar amount for one trip for one person is \$1550.00.

Total for the two-year grant period is \$6,200 for two executives.
