COLORADO SLIGP 2.0 Application Narrative State and Local Implementation Grant Program

The State of Colorado, Governor's Office of Information Technology (OIT) and the Department of Public Safety's Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management (DHSEM) are pleased to present this application for the State and Local Implementation Grant Program (SLIGP) 2.0. Included in this application are OIT's and DHSEM's answers to the three questions posed in the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) Executive Summary announced by the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA), U.S. Department of Commerce.

1. A comprehensive explanation of the allowable activities that will be conducted using SLIGP 2.0 funds, how the applicant aims to resource and conduct these activities, the objectives and outcomes of these activities, and how conducting these activities will support the deployment of the NPSBN in their State. Note that applicants have the discretion to choose among the allowable activities described in section D.6.a, as it is not mandatory to perform all activities listed in that section.

If successfully awarded SLIGP 2.0 grant funds, Colorado will utilize the grant funding to continue to support the governing body representing the diverse stakeholder interests of Colorado, including Rural, Urban, Local, State, and Tribal concerns through monthly public meetings. These meetings support the dissemination of FirstNet information, and allow AT&T and FirstNet to gain direct feedback on performance, issues, and overall technology implementation and integration of the National Public Safety Broadband Network (NPSBN).

Allowable Grant Activity: Single officer (or governmental body) and staff to, at a minimum, provide for ongoing coordination with NTIA and implementation of grant funds.

Colorado plans to direct the grant funds to research, develop, and integrate data sharing policies and agreements between existing public safety systems, and across various agencies. The OIT team proposes to conduct regular meetings and manage necessary vendor requirements to support activities to include, but are not limited to, data sharing policy requirements, collection of current data, documentation, and solutions. All of these activities may include working with vendors that offer data sharing technology and support, and support of future data sharing, technology implementation and integration.

Allowable Grant Activity: Development of policies and agreements to increase sharing of data between existing public safety systems across various agencies within the State or territory using the NPSBN.

Research and develop activities by the OIT team will support the integration and implementation of emergency communications and technology which could include but are not limited to collection of requirements for emergency communications technology transitions, selection of a vendor in support of collection of requirements, solution suggestions, and preparation of support documents for FirstNet on emergency communications technology transition, integration and implementation, and best practice suggestions.

Allowable Grant Activity: Planning activities to prepare for emergency communications technology transitions.

Furthermore, the OIT team will engage in research requirements pertaining to development, implementation, and integration for the transition of public safety applications, software, and databases throughout Colorado. Specific activities may include:

- Identification of legal and geo-political related hurdles to information sharing across jurisdictions at all levels and the development of template agreements to facilitate data/information sharing and application interoperability.
- Working with existing communications managers at the local and state level to identify specific application needs and develop mechanisms for technology transition to LTE based communications.
- Coordinating activities of existing application mechanisms (i.e. Colorado Information Sharing Consortium) to work with new technologies and expand inclusion of data sources.
- Working with existing application vendors to understand technical issues that prevent information sharing and develop potential solutions.

These activities may require hiring a third party vendor to support these efforts and deliver the best practices. The primary reason for 3rd party assistance would be for technical, legal, operational or other specific functional knowledge that is required to identify key issues and develop necessary solutions.

Allowable Grant Activity: Activities to identify and plan for the transition of public safety applications, software, and databases.

Finally, Colorado will utilize the grant funds to provide for identification and documentation of ongoing coverage gap analysis after the completion of an IOC period. This ongoing analysis will potentially consist of engagement of a third party contractor based on the allowable activities established by the NTIA. This could include drive-testing, gap analysis, documentation generation, and conducting regular meetings in order to understand persistent coverage issues and provide feedback to FirstNet and AT&T.

Allowable Grant Activity: Identifying and documenting on-going coverage needs/gaps within the State.

2. A description of capacity to manage and conduct programmatic activities of the award and ability to adhere to NTIA grant reporting and compliance requirements described in section F.3.

The responsibilities for programmatic activities of SLIGP 2.0 and adherence to reporting and compliance requirements of NTIA are divided between the two Colorado State Agencies. The FirstNet Colorado team at OIT conducts the programmatic activities and coordination efforts to fulfill the grant requirements, while DHSEM's Grants and Contracts team ensures an additional layer of oversight on allowable activities, proper and accurate financial reporting, and compliance with the Uniform Grant Guidance. By working as a partnership for over five years on SLIGP 1.0, the FirstNet Colorado team at OIT ankd the Grants and Contracts team at DHSEM have a clear understanding, comprehensive and successful record managing the grant funds and activities of SLIGP 1.0. The continued partnership ensures the adherence to the requirements of SLIGP 2.0 and grant requirements of NTIA.

3. A high-level staffing plan that clearly designates which individuals or positions will be responsible for fulfilling programmatic and grant management requirements.

The FirstNet Colorado team consists of Chief Operating Officer and State Point of Contact (SPOC), Brian Shepherd, Broadband Implementation Manager, Kim Coleman Madsen, Outreach and Education Manager, Ed Mills, Project Manager, Sarah Smith, and OIT Accountant, Nancy Gibson-Johnson. Each of the members have a percentage of their time they are able to dedicate to the project ranging from 20% - 35%. These positions are applied towards the 20% match contribution requirement of the grant.

The DHSEM Grants and Contracts team consist of Grants and Contracts Manager, Esther Son, who coordinates with the State financial reporting system and the preparation of the Federal Financial Reports to ensure budget requirements are met, on schedule, and reported each quarter. And DHSEM's Grant Specialist, Larisa Cannon, who handles the project budget coordination between OIT and NTIA, and reviews for allowable and allocable activities in reimbursement requests from OIT. Both members provide 15% of dedicated time to the grant and request salary and benefits paid from the grant within the grant application.

- Outreach and Education Manager [OEM] (Federal \$0, Non-Federal \$44,400):
- Grant support oversight for a majority of the day-to-day interaction with all stakeholders. We anticipate this individual spending a significant amount of their time traveling throughout the state for localized meetings and planning sessions within the allowable activities. The program manager will spend 30% of their time on SLIGP 2.0 Grant Allowable Activities for 2 years. The annual salary is \$74,000.
- Project Manager [PM] (Federal \$0, Non-Federal \$41,250): Grant support responsible for developing and maintaining projects plans, contact databases, tracking metrics, scheduling and providing general support to the overall effort. • Mileage for SLIGP Staff In-State Travel (Federal \$9,408, Non-Federal \$0):

Estimating 4 trips per month for 24 months for a total of 96 trips for meetings with stakeholders, presentations and other responsibilities. Colorado currently reimburses mileage at \$0.49 per mile. Average cost per trip is 300 round trip miles at \$0.49 per mile (\$147), lodging at \$175 per night, and \$70 per diem for a total of \$392 per member.
- Travel Line Item (Federal \$3,240, Non-Federal \$0): In state travel reimbursements for local stakeholders to attend regional or statewide meetings dedicated to the SLIGP process. Approximately 10 requests total. Average cost per local stakeholder trip is 160 round trip miles at \$0.49 per mile (\$78 rounded), lodging at \$175 per night, and \$70 per diem for a total of \$323 per local stakeholder.

- Statewide meeting venues rental (Federal \$4,000 Non-Federal \$0): For large statewide meetings to support stakeholder input on for allowable activities. Budget \$1,000 per event and 2 events per year for 2 years for a total of 4 events.
