Regular board and committee meetings were conducted each month. Each of the committees had a standard agenda. The agenda items for the committees included an ISICS update, FirstNet update, and any additional New Business to disucss. RIC meetings were held locally/online each month with discussion on FIRSTNET and the role of the RIC. Meetings with AT&T were conducted on the aspects of future regional outreach events in 2021. Distributed our monthly newsletter with FirstNet updates. Continued working with AT&T to further promote outreach of FirstNet and deliver timely updates concerning new tower sites, apps, and other tools available for public safety.

- 11a.2: A total of 14 individuals were sent to broadband conferences.
- 11a.3: During the SLIGP 2.0 period of performance, ISICSB hosted a Region 7 FirstNet Forum event as requested by FirstNet. There were approximately 120 attendees at this event. Five additional regional stakeholder outreach events were held with a combined total of 160 attendees. The most notable event was the two-day Region 7 Forum. Topics of discussion at the forum included demonstrations, FRNA roadmap, early adopter showcase, mythbusters, voice communications, deployables, and FirstNet Executive Board update. The forum also included RAN breakout sessions that included topics such as state plan buildout, coverage technologies, secure information exchange, situational awareness, and user experience discussions. There were several speakers representing AT&T/FirstNet at the forum. The 5 regional outreach events included presentations by AT&T/FirstNet representatives.
- 11a.5: A contract was executed in August 2019 but not reported in the PPR
- 11a.8: Meetings with AT&T were conducted on the aspects of future regional outreach events in 2021. Distributed our monthly newsletter with FirstNet updates. Continue working with AT&T to further promote outreach of FirstNet and deliver timely updates concerning new tower sites, apps, and other tools available for public safety. Developed with AT&T 2020 first/second half outreach calendar. Working with new Region 7 FirstNet contact for a 2021 strategy, possibly holding another Region 7 meeting in lowa in 2021. Planning for future RIC outreach events for all regions. Look for new opportunities to expand on SLIGP2 uses and ways to improve on public safety broadband knowledge in lowa. These activities helped to identify potential public safety users.

11c. Did you perform activities during the last quarter of the grant that haven't been reported previously (i.e., new programmatic activities, staffing changes)? If so, please describe.
Two individuals were sent to the Boulder FirstNet lab. The trip included two days of touring the Boulder lab, presentations by FirstNet representatives, question/answer sessions, and tour of the Public Safety Research Center (PSRC).
Facebook, YouTube, LinkedIn, Twitter, and the website are updated daily/weekly/monthly on FIRSTNET related articles that are found and retweeted on ISICSB accounts. Distributed a monthly newsletter to approximately 2,000 stakeholders. The newsletter contained a monthly "note from the FirstNet representative", FirstNet recent news, FirstNet educational items, and FirstNet resources.
11d. Please share any lessons learned or best practices that your organization implemented during your SLIGP 2.0 project.
11d: We learned that there is a need to continue to educate and discuss the NPSBN with our stakeholders, as their perspectives are imperative to the success of the NPSBN in the state of lowa.
ISICSB conducted a total of six successful stakeholder events across the state of lowa at the request of FirstNet in the disciplines of police, fire, emergency medical services, and public safety communications. Each of the events included a session dedicated to use cases, which we learned is one of the best ways to educate potential users on the benefits of the NPSBN. We estimate that these events were successful in educating approximately 280 key stakeholders from the state of lowa and surrounding Region 7 states on the NPSBN. The ISICSB staff was proud of these events, as we dedicated a lot of time to planning them. The Region 7 FirstNet Forum was our largest and biggest achievement, as we brought in stakesholders from other surrounding states (lowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska). Throughout these stakeholder and outreach events, we learned that it is extremely important for us to continue to educate, answer questions, and have open discussions regarding the NPSBN with our stakeholders, as their perspectives are imperative to the success of the NPSBN in the state of lowa.
ISICSB and the State of Iowa learned that the biggest challenge to subscription within the state related to lack of coverage. This made it imparative for us to continue speaking with stakesholders, sharing user experiences, and having honest and open discussions to ensure that the NPSBN lived up to its expectations. We learned that this is an ongoing topic that will need to continue to be addressed as the buildout of the network nears completion and beyond its completion. We also learned that another barrier to subscription was related to cost. To address all of these concerns, we utilized SLIGP 2.0 funds to measure coverage gaps. We also worked closely with FirstNet and AT&T to report areas of coverage concern. Additionally, we provided interested agencies throughout the state of lowa with FirstNet and AT&T contacts to discuss adopting FirstNet.
In addition to programmatic work completed, the SLIGP 2.0 grant program provided additional opportunities to interact with FirstNet Authority and AT&T and maintain improved communications. After the grant program, we will continue to engage and collaborate with both organizations. We plan to continue getting FirstNet/AT&T updates at our monthly ISICSB Board Meetings, as well as updates at our ongoing monthly FirstNet Broadband Subcommittee meetings.
