Kansas State and Local Implementation Grant Program (SLIGP) 2.0

Application Narrative

The State and Local Implementation Grant Program (2.0) for Kansas will support the State's activities to further plan the details of the nationwide public safety broadband network (NPSBN) deployment and public safety user adoption. This narrative describes an overview of planned activities supporting the deployment, the capacity to manage and conduct these activities, the ability to adhere to reporting requirements, and the staffing plan for the SLIGP 2.0 programmatic and grant management.

I. Background

Kansas is the 34th largest state in the nation based on population (2,907,289), and it is 13th largest based on geographic size (82,278 square miles). Approximately half of the population is concentrated in the eastern portion of the state. The northwestern region is the least populated section in the state, which also exhibits the most gaps in broadband coverage.

The state of Kansas is comprised of 105 counties, 4 tribal nations, 626 incorporated cities, 1,404 townships, approximately 1,370 unincorporated cities, and up to 70,000 NPSBN potential users. Kansas consists of primarily small, rural jurisdictions; only two counties have 200,000 in population. There are distinct differences between the three largest metro areas and the smaller, rural jurisdictions, which typically operate with limited budgets and staff.

Kansas has a history of strong state and local support for building interoperable communications capacity and successfully coordinating statewide projects with local government jurisdictions. For example, Kansas successfully built out a statewide P25 trunked 800 MHz radio system that required extensive coordination with local jurisdictions, counties, and homeland security regions.

Interoperability communications planning and funding has been a focus in Kansas since 2005, when the Kansas Homeland Security Regional Councils were formed. At that time, communications project leaders from each region began meeting quarterly to share information on communications projects in hope of aligning efforts and avoiding unnecessary duplication of services. From this informal group, a statewide initiative was created. In July of 2007, a full-time Interoperable Communications Coordinator was employed by the Kansas Adjutant General. The Coordinator was tasked with the creation and implementation of a

statewide governance structure and a strategic plan addressing interoperable emergency communications. The Kansas Statewide Interoperability Executive Committee (SIEC) was chartered by the Kansas Commission on Emergency Planning and Response, and the SIEC held its first formal meeting 2007. Later that year, after the recommendation of members to pursue executive-level backing for interoperable communications activities, the governor signed Executive Order #07-27, establishing the SIEC under executive jurisdiction.

The SIEC membership, which is comprised of 14 public officials as well as representatives of primary stakeholders, plans and makes recommendations on policy, procedures and other activities that will enhance communications interoperability throughout Kansas. Administrative functions are handled by the Statewide Interoperability Coordinator (SWIC). The SIEC members are as follows: Kansas Association of Sheriffs, Kansas Chapter of Association of Public Safety Communications Officials (APCO), Kansas Association of Chiefs of Police, Kansas Highway Patrol, Kansas Board of EMS, Kansas State Fire Chiefs Association, Kansas Department of Transportation, Kansas Association of Counties, Kansas Emergency Management Association, Kansas Adjutant General's Department, League of Kansas Municipalities, Kansas Office of Information Technology Services, Kansas Native American Affairs Office, Kansas 911 Coordinating Council, and Mid-America Regional Council. Kansas Department of Commerce and Kansas Division of Emergency Management are non-voting, advisory members.

In addition to the SWIC, other staff dedicated to emergency communications in Kansas include two Training and Exercise Specialists and two Communications on Wheels technicians, all located within the Kansas Division of Emergency Management Emergency Communications Section (ECS). A portion of the SWIC and Training and Exercise Specialists' time will support SLIGP 2.0 activities. Additional positions will be added to this section through SLIGP 2.0 funding to further support planning for NPSBN deployment and adoption. Grant management and staffing plan details are discussed further in sections III and IV of the narrative.

Under the SLIGP 1.0, the State of Kansas conducted planning activities, evaluated options for NPSBN deployment, and completed extensive data collection and surveys. These efforts culminated with the recommendation by SIEC and the Single Point of Contact (SPOC) for Kansas to opt-in to the FirstNet plan. Governor Brownback announced his acceptance of the NPSBN deployment plan offered by FirstNet in August 2017.

In Sections II, III, and IV, the narrative describes Kansas' planned activities to help further the deployment and public safety user adoption of the NPSBN as a FirstNet Opt-In State.

II. Overview of Activities Supporting the Deployment of the National Public Safety Broadband Network

Kansas anticipates conducting work during the project period in each of the allowable Opt-In activity categories listed in the NOFO (page 18). Note that the bullet points correspond *directly* to allowable activities in the NOFO and are thus consistent with the NOFO. At no time will Kansas undertake activities or incur costs that are outside of the scope of the NOFO, which includes appropriate FirstNet requests and approvals. Specifically, stakeholder outreach activities and data collection efforts will be conducted only at the request of and in coordination with FirstNet. Activities (C), (I), and (J) would require a request/approval from FirstNet. This would be confirmed in writing, either electronic or paper.

Key constituencies include primary users identified by the state and agreed upon by FirstNet: law enforcement, fire, emergency medical services, emergency management, hospital emergency rooms, and emergency communications centers/911 public safety answering points. Additional constituencies include extended primary users as approved by the SIEC and FirstNet. These constituencies apply to all activities.

There are several **activity examples** already listed below within each bullet point, but additional examples have been added to a few activities.

- A. *Single officer (or governmental body) and staff to, at a minimum, provide for ongoing coordination with NTIA and implementation of grant funds.* The SWIC will serve as the single point of contact (SPOC) in coordination with the NTIA and implementation of grant funds; he will be the liaison between the SIEC, ECC staff, **identified primary users**, and outside organizations and partners. The SWIC will keep the SIEC apprised of coordination activities and request advisement, as appropriate. He will also coordinate and stay apprised with other states and with FEMA Region VII. Some coordination activities will be delegated by the SWIC to other ECS staff.
- B. *Existing governance body to provide input to the single officer and to contribute towards planning activities to further identify potential public safety users of the NPSBN and prepare for data sharing.* During the SLIGP 1.0 process, the SIEC helped identify and reach out to the potentially 70,000 public safety NPSBN users. A database of users was created in relation to the initial 1.0 state data collection piece. During SLIGP 2.0, critical information in this user list will be updated as needed, though the focus will be pushing

out information through the SIEC and pre-existing channels. Grant activities will include outreach and awareness efforts by the SWIC and other ECS staff, with the SIEC helping to reach out, share information, and update distribution contacts.

- C. *Data collection in specific areas identified to be helpful as requested by FirstNet.* The SWIC and ECS staff will support data collection as requested by FirstNet, including data related to coverage by jurisdiction, agency, tribal nations, device-specific, identification congestion-related issues, and other data needs. These activities will likely be primarily conducted by contractors, in response to specific requests and needs identified during the project period. The SWIC or other ECS staff will manage and monitor contractor data collection work. [These would be conducted at the request of FirstNet. Examples of potential data requests include identifying currently fielded data by discipline and device type, how those devices are utilized to receive and disseminate information, identifying eligible primary and extended primary users within a jurisdiction, etc.](#)
- D. *Development of policies and agreements to increase sharing of data between existing public safety systems across various agencies within the State or territory using the NPSBN.* A new position in the ECS funded through SLIGP 2.0 will be the Public Safety Broadband Program Coordinator (Broadband Coordinator). The Broadband Coordinator will further governance of the NPSBN in the state, including the development of policies and procedures to ensure Kansas is set-up with a long-term solution for effective rollout and deployment of the NPSBN. Activities will include reviewing the SIEC executive order to determine roles, responsibilities, and expectations of the governing body in relation to FirstNet and working with the SIEC, FirstNet, and its partner AT&T to set up protocols for deployment and adoption statewide.
- E. *Individuals, such as the single officer and governing body members, to perform planning activities to help FirstNet and its partner further identify potential public safety users of the NPSBN.* SIEC as the governing body, with the assistance of SWIC and other staff, will reach out to their organizational constituencies to improve awareness of the NPSBN opportunities, provide contact information to FirstNet, and pass along potential concerns or potential barriers to adoption to FirstNet.

- F. *Planning efforts to help FirstNet gain inclusion on applicable statewide contract vehicles.* For the most part, this activity has already been completed. The State of Kansas is utilizing the NASPO contract, and FirstNet has gained inclusion to the state contracting system. However, for related activities, the Broadband Coordinator will provide technical assistance to state agencies, local jurisdictions, local agencies to connect them with FirstNet in setting up contractual agreements related to the deployment. ECS staff and the SIEC will work with AT&T and FirstNet to set up and make available contracting templates for local and state entities.
- G. *Planning activities to prepare for emergency communications technology transitions.* These planning activities will be a focus of the Kansas SLIGP 2.0; a significant portion of staff time will be dedicated to transitions. Activities will include working with FirstNet and public safety agencies to demonstrate the benefits of adoption; helping responders plan for the transition to and adoption of the system; identifying ways to use the system to an agency's benefit at both state and local agencies; demonstrating how it can enhance a first responder's job; setting up guidances and protocols for transitions; training for aspects of the transitions; and developing credentialing plans, protocols, and tools for the system usage. The two training specialist positions partially supporting the state match for the SLIGP 2.0 will conduct much of this work.
- H. *Activities to identify and plan for the transition of public safety applications, software, and databases.* These activities will be primarily conducted by the Strategic Initiatives Coordinator (SIC), which will be a newly hired position under SLIGP 2.0. The SIC will direct initiatives evaluating potential new applications (apps) and identifying barriers and solutions related to the transition of databases and software to the NPSBN in coordination with state and local jurisdictions, FirstNet, and AT&T. This may include developing workgroups or committees under the SIEC to evaluate and make recommendations on products offered by vendors and solutions adopted by other states; planning for integration with 911 public safety answering points and other special partner groups; planning for transition and adoption by discipline during disaster management (e.g., sheriff, local police, fire, EMS, hospital, public works, etc.); planning for transition challenges specific to the large number of volunteer responders in Kansas; identifying technical and functional barriers to the transition of applications, software, and databases; researching potential new apps and transition solutions; identifying

application functionality, software, and database needs; creating protocols and validating how apps will work across disciplines and different devices; and determining best practices and protocols for the transition, installation and/or usage of applications, software and databases. In addition to the SIC and possibly the training specialists, this activity will rely heavily on contractors to assist with specific tasks.

I. *Identifying and documenting on-going coverage needs/gaps within the State.*

Contractors will be utilized to assist ECS staff with this task as requests are made by FirstNet. Activities may include identifying and documenting coverage gaps and needs, both general needs/gaps and those specific to geography, tribal nations, local jurisdictions, disciplines, and event congestion. If specific coverage gaps are forwarded by [primary users or other stakeholders](#), ECS staff will also relay information to FirstNet. [If FirstNet requests follow-up or assistance, ECS staff may, for example, conduct surveys to include interviews with primary users, specific location tests, deployment of devices for testing by primary users, etc.](#)

J. *Activities to convene stakeholder outreach events to continue planning for NPSBN implementation, as requested by FirstNet.* Based on initial conversations with FirstNet, stakeholder meetings are planned [with identified primary users](#) in each of the seven homeland security regions. [These meetings will highlight the benefits of the network, how to subscribe, access and speed of the network, utilization and public safety applications for primary user disciplines, and how to utilize the network to their advantage during emergencies and disasters.](#) NPSBN ECS staff will assist with planning additional meetings and events, as requested by FirstNet throughout the project period.

III. Capacity to Manage and Conduct Programmatic Activities of Award and Adhere to Requirements

Kansas is a willing and eager applicant for the State and Local Implementation Grant Program 2.0. The state has the capacity to successfully manage and conduct programmatic activities and the ability to adhere to NTIA grant reporting and compliance requirements. Since 2005, the state has had a highly successful track record in public safety grant application, coordination and guidance. Kansas has developed and executed effective programs that have brought valued-added capabilities to the widest variety of agencies and jurisdictions within the state.

Using previously awarded grant funds, Kansas created an Office of Emergency Communications that included the Statewide Interoperability Coordinator and two trainers. This team along with full partners from the Kansas Department of Transportation and Kansas Highway Patrol planned, designed, constructed and completed an 800MHz P25 trunked radio system with near 100% state coverage. Kansas, with the support of this team, has been actively preparing for Public Safety Broadband since 2012, designating a single point of contact at that time and engaging Kansas' governing body, the SIEC. (See Section I for additional information on the SIEC.) The SIEC assumed responsibility, in accordance with their Executive Order and charter, for the governance of public safety broadband within Kansas. The current Statewide Communication Interoperability Plan (SCIP) includes goals and initiatives to support the deployment of the NPSBN. Under the Office of Information Technology Services, the Office of Emergency Communications successfully implemented the SLIGP 1.0 grant, which led to the Governor Brownback announcing his acceptance of the NPSBN deployment plan offered by FirstNet in August 2017 and Kansas becoming an Opt-In State.

As Kansas moves to planning for NPSBN deployment and public safety user adoption in the post-State Plan period, the Office of Emergency Communications became the Emergency Communications Section (ECS) within the Kansas Division of Emergency Management (KDEM), effective November 1st, 2017. This move to KDEM increases the capacity and visibility of the Emergency Communications team because KDEM supports all public safety disciplines and has close working relationships with these stakeholders. This also improves the capacity for planning and sets the team up to be more involved and work more directly with key stakeholders related to governance development for successful long-term adoption of the NPSBN.

Finally, KDEM has significant experience in federal grants management and reporting. The fiscal and grants management staff will ensure that reporting and compliance requirements are met. These include quarterly performance progress and financial reports; close out reporting; timely responses to audits; and other award requirements, terms, and conditions as specified by NTIA.

IV. Staffing Plan for Fulfilling Programmatic and Grant Management Requirements

The governing body for Kansas is the State Interoperability Executive Committee (SIEC), created by Executive Order of the Governor in 2007. The SIEC will be kept apprised of activities

throughout the SLIGP 2.0 project periods and will advise on the NPSBN roll-out. The staffing plan for the SLIGP 2.0 consists of the following key positions:

- **The Statewide Interoperability Coordinator (SWIC)** serves as the **Single Point of Contact (SPOC)** and leads the Emergency Communications Section (ECS) of KDEM. Mr. Jason Bryant has been serving as the SWIC for 4 years, and he has 13 years' experience in public safety communications. Throughout the SLIGP 1.0 project period, Mr. Bryant worked with the SPOC, the SIEC and TAG to direct planning efforts and forward recommendations on NPSBN implementation to the Governor's office. He was recently named Kansas' SPOC with the move of the Emergency Communications office to KDEM and will serve as the SPOC for SLIGP 2.0.

In this next phase, 35% of the SWIC's time will be devoted to SLIGP 2.0 activities. This will include supervision of grant-funded positions, serving as the single point of contact for FirstNet and AT&T, reaching out and coordinating with other states on implementation and adoption plans, meeting with FEMA Region VII, attending meetings and conferences, and serving as the liaison between the governing body and other staff and stakeholders.

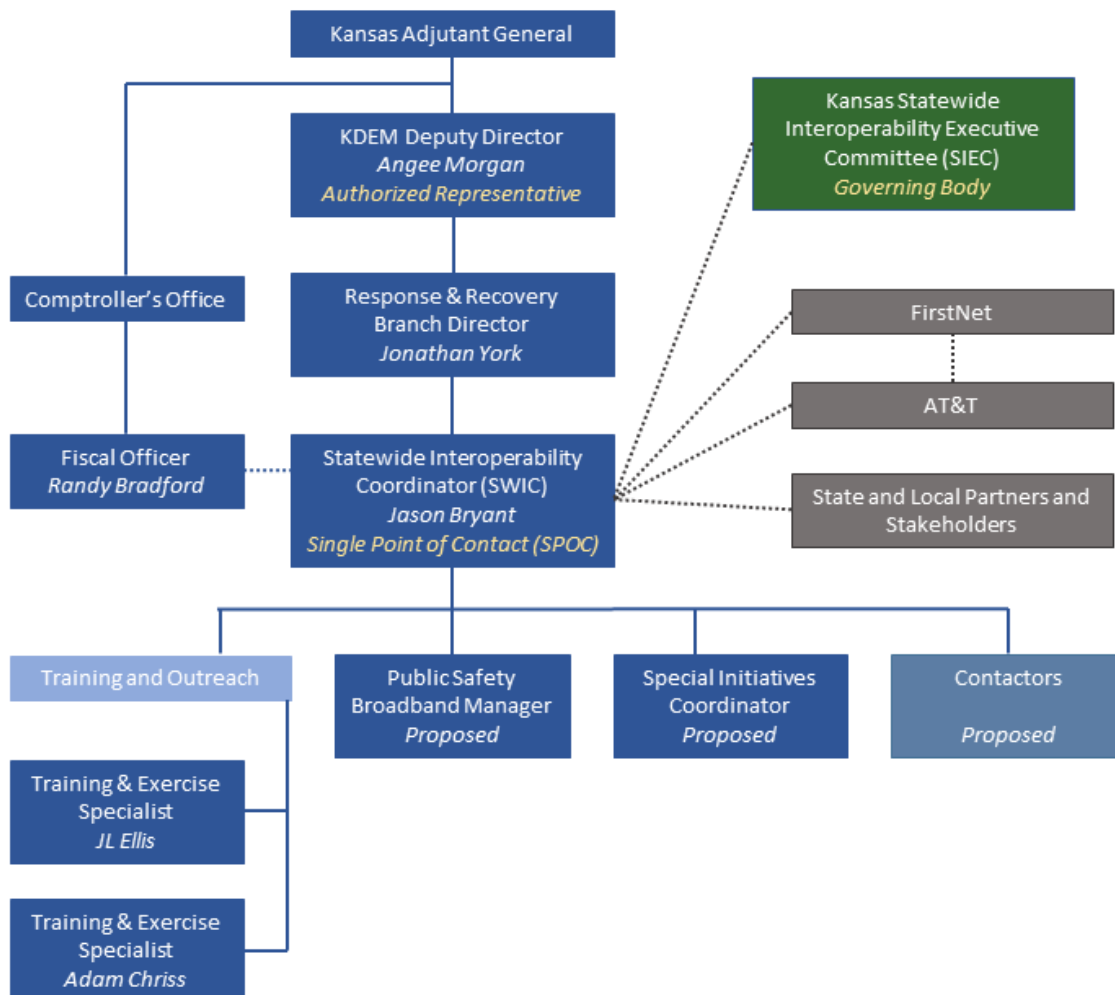
- **Two Training and Exercise Specialists** within the ECS, Mr. JL Ellis and Mr. Adam Chriss, will devote 35% of their time to SLIGP 2.0 activities. Mr. Ellis has been in his current position related to communications training and exercising since 2008 and helped support the SLIGP 1.0 activities. Mr. Chriss has been with the office since August and comes from a communications technology and training background.

The training and exercise specialists will conduct research, testing, and training as directed by the SWIC. They will develop training materials, test apps, and plan for coordinating the adoption and usage effort in the context of public safety and in support of the network adopters.

- **The Public Safety Broadband Coordinator** is a proposed new position to be funded under the SLIGP 2.0 and located within the ECS under the supervision of the SWIC. This position will be devote 100% of their time to grant activities, with a focus on governance, including reviewing the scope and application of the executive order; determining SIEC expectations, roles and responsibilities in relation to FirstNet; coordinating meetings with infrastructure and stakeholders, as directed; attending meetings and conferences; and other activities as directed by the SWIC.

- **The Special Initiatives Coordinator** is a proposed new position to be funded under the SLIGP 2.0 and located within the ECS under the supervision of the SWIC. This position will be hired as a temporary position and will have up to 999 hours available per year for grant activities, with a focus on coordinating statewide initiatives for public safety broadband with other stakeholder disciplines; staffing special workgroups under SIEC formed to address transition and usage issues specific to applications, databases, software, credentialing, 911 integration, ICS integration, etc.; and other duties as directed by the SWIC.
- **Contractors** will be hired as needed to assist with special tasks throughout the grant project period. This will include assistance with data collection requested by FirstNet; research and planning for transition of software, databases, and applications; identifying and documenting coverage gaps; and other needs as identified by the ECS team.

Other positions will support SLIGP 2.0 activities through managerial, programmatic, and fiscal oversight, as shown in the below organizational chart.



In conclusion, Kansas has the plans, programmatic technical specialists, the grants management experience, and the fiscal components in place to effectively manage and complete the timely execution of the State and Local Implementation Grant Program 2.0

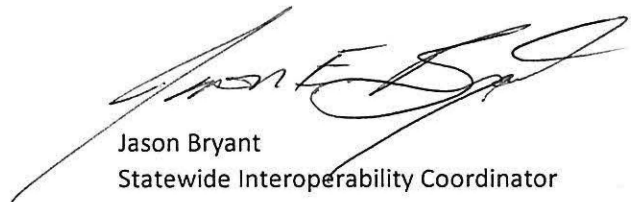
RE: Kansas Letter of Designation
