New York State SLIGP 2.0 Application Narrative

The State of New York welcomes this opportunity to apply for funding under the State and Local Implementation Grant Program 2.0 (2018-NTIA-SLIGP-2). As a recipient of the original SLIGP funding, New York used the available federal funding to further our State's public safety engagements with NTIA, FirstNet and AT&T.


The Governor of the State of New York has designated Deputy Commissioner Kevin E. Wisely of the Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services (DHSES) as the State Point of Contact (SPOC). Mr. Wisely's staff in the Office of Interoperable and Emergency Communications (OIEC) have been engaged in the national public safety broadband (PSBB) work since 2009, including the entire length of the FirstNet project and the SLIGP 1.0 grant.

Now in our 18th quarter of the original SLIGP grant, along with DHSES's role as the State Administrative Agency (SAA) for Federal homeland security and emergency grants received by New York, and with over 55 employees working on Federal grant administration and finance, New York is well positioned to manage the SLIGP 2.0 grant award.

Under this grant, existing State employee staff will serve as the non-Federal match share to SLIGP 2.0. Staff who will work on the SLIGP 2.0 grant are the same staff who worked on the original SLIGP grant, and will continue to utilize the same time standard time and attendance tracking system to delineate SLIGP eligible time from non-eligible time. Detailed breakdowns of staff match time percentages are provided in the budget documents.

- The State Point of Contact (SPOC) (not Federally funded or State matched under SLIGP)
 - o Executive oversight of the entire State engagement in public safety broadband.
 - Fulfils the requirement of the Act and of the NTIA for the State to maintain a designated SPOC.
- The Director of OIEC, who is also the Statewide Interoperability Coordinator
 - o Provides day to day managerial and approval control of the PSBB activities.
 - Chairs the State governance board.
- Deputy Director of OIEC
 - Support the Director in his activities.
 - o Develops the Next Generation 911 (NG911) strategy and plans for New York.

- OIEC Radio Engineers
 - Conduct day to day analysis, reporting and public safety stakeholder outreach on PSBB.
 - o Engages with public safety, evaluating and recommending solutions for identified needs.
 - Engages in regular interaction with FirstNet and AT&T staff on PSBB needs and events within the State.
 - Manages the SLIGP grant program and reporting, excluding fiscal reporting.
- OIEC Senior Administrative Analyst
 - Assists with meeting planning and outreach support.
- Agency Budget Analyst
 - o Prepares SLIGP fiscal reports and spending analysis.
 - o Prepares SLIGP budget documents.
- DHSES Counsel's Office (Excelsior Fellow)
 - Legal review of project documents and plans.
 - Legal review of any applicable laws related to the NPSBN.



As one of the planned expenditures of the SLIGP 2.0 grant funding, New York intends to hire a contractor/consultant firm (using an existing State contract) to assist with conducting allowable opt-in activities. As this same contractor has been working with New York for the duration of the original SLIGP grant, we expect no "ramp up" time will be necessary. The contractor will support the State staff in conducting the allowable activities under SLIGP 2.0. The contractor works under the direction of the State and conducts efforts with the scope of work and within the allowable SLIGP 2.0 activities. Activities the contractor will perform include, but are not limited to: assisting with data collection; data analysis; drafting policies and guidelines; broadband user group governance development and group administration; assist in the creation of reports to FirstNet; miscellaneous support activities and project management.

New York intends to conduct the following activities during the SLIGP 2.0 grant term:

Maintain a Single Point of Contact (SPOC)

New York will maintain a SPOC. This person is an existing full time State employee at the executive level and will not be funded, directly or indirectly, by SLIGP. However, the SPOC will maintain executive oversight of the entire State engagement in public safety broadband.

Existing Governance Body

The State has, in statue, a State Interoperable and Emergency Communication Board (SIEC Board). This advisory Board's role encompasses many aspects of interoperable and emergency communications. Shortly after the national creation of FirstNet, the SIEC Board in New York created a Public Safety Broadband Working Group (PSBBWG). This working group consists of members of various public safety disciplines from throughout the State. As a transition occurs from procurement and opt decision to implementation of FirstNet, so will this working group transition. We envision this group will become a user committee focused group, advising on topics relevant to the adoption and transition to FirstNet. Among other tasks, this group will meet regularly to discuss items of concern, and request the SPOC team bring to FirstNet and AT&T's attention. SLIGP 2.0 funding will be used to assist in facilitation of meetings of this transitioned user group. SLIGP 2.0 funds will not be used for the larger SIEC Board, as that is a State activity.

Data Collection, as requested by FirstNet

As was done in the original SLIGP grant term, the State will stand ready to collect data from public safety stakeholders, analyze that data, and provide to FirstNet. Until FirstNet makes those data requests, we are unable to identify specific deliverables, however we commit to working with FirstNet on those requests. We have the advantage of years of relationships with the public safety community in New York and can quickly reach the right individuals to obtain information that is needed.

Development of Policies and Agreements to Increase Data Sharing

The State will work with FirstNet and other State and local agencies to enhance data sharing. We will evaluate the types of data that FirstNet would like to make available on the National Public Safety Broadband Network (NPSBN), matching with whom the data owners are, and facilitate discussions among the parties of what changes (if any) are needed to share that data. Our legal staff member will review any relevant State statues and recommend potential changes that would improve the data sharing, as needed.

Individuals, such as the SPOC, to perform planning activities

As discussed in the staffing section, the State will provide staffing utilizing existing State employees as state share in-kind match. All staff working on the project have been engaged in PSBB and are well versed in the topics and requirements. These employees will continue to conduct communication and coordination with the public safety community, both to provide information on potential transition to the NPSBN but also to receive their feedback and address it appropriately. The SPOC team has regular meetings with FirstNet and AT&T representatives, and intends to continue that dialog as the program transitions into adoption.

Time tracking for the match will be done in the State's centralized time software, known the Leave and Accrual Tracking System (LATS). This system was used for tracking match time in the original SLIGP grant and has served that purpose well. Detailed breakdowns of the match calculations are included in the application's budget documents.

Planning efforts to help FirstNet gain including on statewide contract vehicles

AT&T has an existing State procurement contract for cellular services. AT&T expects that FirstNet data plans will be a pricing table amendment to that contract. This is primarily a routine responsibility of AT&T and the State Office of General Services, and therefore is not a significant activity under SLIGP 2.0 for New York. However, the SPOC team stands ready to assist in providing background and other information as needed to ensure this inclusion happens in a timely manner.

Planning activities to prepare for emergency communications technology transitions.

The State will update its SCIP plan, as well as work with our county consortiums on their TICPs, to incorporate public safety broadband data communications into those documents. While voice communications will continue over land mobile radio (LMR) for the foreseeable future, we will begin an update process to include in those documents portions that are relevant to data interoperability. This will include input on data sharing, application interoperability, priority access considerations, and procedures on planned and unplanned coverage/capacity requests. This includes integrating FirstNet use, network management, and event management in to the Emergency Support Function #2 (ESF-2) role at the State EOC. We will continue to update our psbb.ny.gov website with relevant information.

Planning activities to identify and plan for the transition of public safety applications, software, and databases.

There are numerous Federal, State and local databases used by public safety in New York, as well as applications, both off the shelf and custom, for law enforcement, code enforcement, EMS, etc. New York will work to inventory the applications and data in use by public safety, whether they use mobile data today or could use mobile data in the future. These applications and databases will be placed into "buckets" in terms of their ability to utilize FirstNet. For those that require additional work to transition to FirstNet capable, they will be evaluated and prioritized for the next steps.

Identifying and documenting on-going coverage needs/gaps within the State

New York will develop a web and/or app based geographic information systems (GIS) portal where FirstNet users or prospective users can graphically document their coverage needs or FirstNet coverage gaps. The State will build and support an interactive map which will allow potential FirstNet users to depict areas of inadequate FirstNet/AT&T coverage. Data input by stakeholders will be stored in the open source PostGIS database. This map will be built using open source GIS server tools and coded using the Leaflet API. That information will be provided to FirstNet, on a recurring basis, for consideration. This collection activity will engage public safety and ensure that they can provide useful information to assist FirstNet and AT&T in providing a network that meets the needs and expectations of the user base.

The State will also consider purchasing drive test data or conducting limited drive testing in areas that are identified as problematic by the public safety community, or areas that reflect discrepancies between the FirstNet State Plan and user experiences. This would be accordance with any future NTIA guidance or special conditions placed on such a purchase.

Activities to convene stakeholder outreach events to continue planning, as requested by FirstNet

The State will budget funds for stakeholder events that may be requested by FirstNet. The State is ready and willing to assist in holding meetings, workshops or events that further dialog between FirstNet and the public safety community in New York. Based on information provided during the NTIA SLIGP 2.0 webinars, the State envisions holding events similar to our annual interoperability symposium, but specifically focused on PSBB. Our symposium events normally bring stakeholders from each county, consortium, State and Federal partners to discuss various topics related to interoperability, including broadband. For the events specific to this grant and working in conjunction with FirstNet, similar events will be held but limited to the PSBB topic(s) agreed to with FirstNet. Funds will only be expended when these events are request by FirstNet, and in the NTIA approved manner.

- SWIC (Non-Federal, in-kind): The SWIC, who also serves as the director of the Office of Interoperable and Emergency Communications (OIEC), will provide oversight for the SLIGP grant and governance, ensuring that all activities are completed on time and within budget. The SWIC is delegated by the State Point of Contact (SPOC) to be the point of contact for consultation with FirstNet, and will work to expand the State's governance structure. The budgeted match costs (16.81% time) are only for the duties associated with public safety broadband and the SLIGP grant, not the additional land mobile radio and general interoperable communication duties of the SWIC. The SWIC is not Federally funded.
- Radio Engineer 1 (Non-Federal, in-kind): Radio Engineer #1 will continue to support
 FirstNet and public safety broadband activities, at 42.5% time. This engineer has been
 involved in the State's public safety broadband activities since the State applied for a DBlock waiver in 2009 and continues to support the day to day State involvement in public
 safety broadband. These activities include:
 - o Preparing the SLIGP 2.0 application
 - Conducting outreach on FirstNet/Public Safety Broadband to the State's governance committees and other stakeholder groups
 - Day to day interaction with FirstNet and AT&T

The "Radio Engineer" title is a civil service title and does not indicate a limitation in the types of activities performed. The radio engineer is not Federally funded.

Radio Engineer 2 (Non-Federal, in-kind): Radio Engineer #2 will continue to support
FirstNet and public safety broadband activities, at 5% time. This engineer has been
involved in the State's public safety broadband activities since the State applied for a DBlock waiver in 2009 and continues to support the day to day State involvement in public
safety broadband. These activities include:

- Conducting outreach on FirstNet/Public Safety Broadband to the State's governance committees and other stakeholder groups
- Day to day interaction with FirstNet and AT&T
- o Providing project backup for Radio Engineer #1.

The "Radio Engineer" title is a civil service title and does not indicate a limitation in the types of activities performed. The radio engineer is not Federally funded.

- Associate Budgeting Analyst (Non-Federal, in-kind): The Agency Budget Analyst is
 responsible for the day to day budgeting and fiscal activities of the Office of
 Interoperable and Emergency Communications, including the SLIGP grant. The match
 time is calculated at 5%. The Associate Budgeting Analyst is not Federally funded.
- Agency Counsel's Office (Excelsior Fellow) (Non-Federal, in-kind): The Agency Counsel
 has responsibility for legal, procurement and policy issues associated with interoperable
 and emergency communications activities, including public safety broadband. The match
 time is calculated at 12.5%. The Agency Counsel is not Federally funded.
- Associate Administrative Analyst (Non-Federal, in-kind): The Analyst is responsible for
 policy analysis and staff assistance. The match time is calculated at 5%. The Associate
 Administrative Analyst is not Federally funded.
- Deputy Director of OIEC (Federal, in-kind): Provides oversight and executive input on the SLIGP grant process and public safety broadband. The Deputy Director serves as a backup to the SWIC/OIEC Director. The match time is calculated at 10%. The Deputy Director of OIEC is not Federally funded.

- In-state travel for 3 workshops on public safety broadband (Federal): These workshops, hosted at the request and in conjunction with FirstNet, will be held in-state and used to further public safety broadband uses, applications and overall network development. We have experience hosting interoperability symposia, and therefore estimated the attendance at approximately one-half of those meetings. Based on the cost to reimburse lodging for the local government attendees at these events, which have an average travel cost of \$34,000, we arrived at the number utilized here.
- Travel for Regional and National Meetings with FirstNet or other related national meetings (Federal): State Employees and locals will attend national and regional conferences to meet with FirstNet and share information and collaborate with other grant recipients. Since locations are to be determined, a location was used as an example for cost calculation. Five employees at two meetings per year were assumed. Assumed rates were at GSA or State Contract rates and based on travel history from the original SLIGP grant, we estimated the total travel costs (airfare, hotel, per diem, registration) at \$2,000 per person. Unless FirstNet and other national associations can provide the

meeting locations for the meetings, we cannot be any more specific at this time. Actual charges will be in accordance with all prescribed State, Federal, and where applicable, municipal travel policies.

Contractor services – New York State Technology Enterprise Corporation (NYSTEC) consultant/contractor (Federal): These services will be obtained through a centralized New York State purchasing contract, using State pre-approved rate structures and contract mechanisms. Hourly contract rates are inclusive of fringe and overhead costs. The State will execute a statement of work against the centralized contract once an award is made and funds are available.

The total number of hours of contractor support will be 1,940 for increment one and 3,060 for increment two. These are estimated ceilings, and will not be charged unless directed by the State to conduct allowable activities. The contractor's rates are set by New York State centralized contract, and range from \$55.37 for a support specialist to \$202.21 for the Senior Engineer/Manager from the contractor's team. Contract flexibility permits the moving of time from one role to the other if FirstNet priorities or activities dictate more emphasis in one area over the other.

This contractor support will be used for multiple aspects of the SLIGP 2.0 award, and the contractor's staff will be closely integrated members of the State team. Activities they will be involved in include: data collection, data analysis, development of policies, application transition recommendations, and assisting in FirstNet approved outreach.

- Public safety broadband workshop meeting space (Federal): These workshops, hosted at the request and in conjunction with FirstNet, will be held in-state and used to further public safety broadband uses, applications and overall network development. We have experience hosting interoperability symposia, and therefore estimated the meeting space (conference space) at \$1,500 per workshop.
- Geographic Information Systems (GIS) (Federal): The State's GIS Program Office will build and support an interactive map which would allow potential FirstNet users to depict area of inadequate FirstNet/AT&T coverage. Data input by stakeholders will be stored in the open source PostGIS database. This map will be built using open source GIS server tools and coded using the Leaflet API. This contract reflects the portion for open source setup and support, application development assistance and commercial cloud usage.
- Miscellaneous contract(s) (Federal): While our primary contractor services contract is
 expected to meet most needs of the State during the 2-year period of performance, it is
 possible that FirstNet will make specific requests of the State that are not possible under
 the primary contract. This contract item will be used to obtain any additional contractual
 services that may prove necessary during the grant term. This may include additional
 types of data collection, coverage data purchases, etc.

As required by Public Law 112-96, and the NTIA Federal Funding Opportunity dated February 6th, 2013, New York State certified that it had designated an official single point of contact (SPOC) for NTIA and FirstNet, as related to public safety wireless broadband.
