Digest:

36.2 - 36.21 - This interim directive (ID) to sections 36.2 to 36.21 updates direction for calendar year (CY) 2003 rental fees for communications uses on National Forest System lands.

At section 36.21, Determination of Fees, this ID adds in paragraph 2f clarification for classifying certain communications uses, licensed by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) as commercial mobile radio service (CMRS), as a cellular telephone and personal communications service (PCS) use for rental calculation purposes. Paragraph 2j adds a new communications use, wireless internet service provider (ISP), and Special Uses Data System (SUDS) use code, 811.

This ID also provides CY 2003 updates to exhibit 01, Rental Fee Schedule for Communications Uses, and exhibit 02, an updated Listing of Cities by Population Strata. These exhibits are used in determining rental fees for communications uses. These exhibits are issued as ID's annually for ease of updating. Exhibit 01 has been updated using the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for

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rental fee calculations in CY 2003 and modified to include the wireless internet service provider (ISP) use in the same rental fee category as microwave. Exhibit 02 has been updated for CY 2003 to include cities that have changed population categories or have been added to or deleted from the Listing of Cities by Population Strata as follows:

38.12 - This interim directive to section 38.12 provides the 2000 to 2003 update to exhibit 01, Adjusted Gross Revenue (AGR) Brackets and Associated Percentage Rates for Use in Determining Ski Area Permit Fee (SAPF) and updates the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for 2002 (for use in calculating 2003 fees).

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36.2 - Communications Site Fee Schedule

This section provides direction for use of the rental fee schedule for communications uses on National Forest System lands. For all communications uses, calculate rental fees using communications site rental calculation worksheets contained in the Special Uses Data System (SUDS) application.

36.21 - Determination of Fees

1. Consider the following when determining fees:
 - b. If the communications site does not serve a listed RMA community (ex. 02), determine the fee based on the population of the largest community served by the site according to the population listed in the 2002, or later, edition of the "Rand McNally Road Atlas" (Atlas). The 2002, or later, edition of the Atlas contains updated population figures for non-RMA communities base on the 2000 United States census. The population figures for 2001, and earlier, editions of the Atlas were based on the 1990 United States census. Therefore, field offices are encouraged to verify population figures for non-RMA communities within their unit and adjust the population strata for rental calculations where appropriate.
2. Apply the fee schedule to communications uses providing the following services:
 - f. Cellular Telephone and Personal Communications Services (PCS). (sec. 48.12b). The cellular telephone and PCS use category includes the following wireless uses:
 - (1) Enhanced Specialized Mobile Radio (ESMR)
 - (2) Improved Mobile Telephone Service (IMTS)
 - (3) Air-to-Ground
 - (4) Offshore Radio Telephone Service
 - (5) Cell Site Extenders
 - (6) Local Multipoint Distribution Service

The preceding uses may be listed as a Commercial Mobile Radio Service (CMRS) use on the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) license. However, for the purpose of rent determination, all these uses must be valued at the rent specified for the "Cellular and PCS" use.

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j. Wireless Internet Service Provider (ISP). The Special Uses Database System (SUDS) use code for a wireless internet service provider (ISP) is 811. An ISP provides subscription wireless access to the internet and the use is not licensed by the FCC. For purposes of rent determination, an ISP is valued at the same rate as a microwave use on the rental schedule. The customer of an ISP, who has a communications facility on National Forest System land to receive and transmit an ISP signal, is considered a private mobile radio service (PMRS) use for rental determination purposes.
